2. Aims of the programme

Rationale and general aims, including what is special about this programme (from the student's and a marketing perspective)

This Pre-Masters in Business aims to provide a highly supportive environment for you to develop your language and academic skills to a standard that allows you to integrate on a taught business postgraduate programme of study with students from other backgrounds. It is designed for students who would like to apply for a postgraduate business programme of study but the level of their English language is below entry requirements (e.g. IELTS 5.0/5.5 or equivalent). Furthermore, if you have not studied for a while and require some time to adjust to an academic setting, then this Pre-Masters in Business would help you to prepare before embarking on the Master's Business degree.

The programme aims:

- 1. To improve your level of English if your language skills are not at the standard required for your chosen programme of study, at the same time providing development of academic skills appropriate to UK study.
- 2. To provide a route of study if you already have the required qualifications to begin a postgraduate degree but want to gain more confidence in your language and academic skills before beginning your postgraduate studies.
- 3. To equip you with the skills to work within, integrate into and function within the UK and its HE system, ensuring you make the transition from the learning and teaching style you have previously experienced to the more independent UK learning environment.

The programme will provide sufficient tuition and hours to support students moving from IELTS 5 to IELTS 6 or 7 (depending on the programme of study).

As a Pre-Masters in Business student you will have the same rights and access to facilities/resources as other full-time students at Leeds Trinity University. All units will be taught with progression to a Leeds Trinity postgraduate programme of study in mind.

5. Content

Summary of content by theme

Overall, the Pre-Masters programme has been designed to be academically challenging, providing an integrated approach to language skills and academic skills and an introduction to the requirements of higher education and your chosen area of study. Alongside the units you study, a key feature in the programme is a tutorial system which has been designed to ensure that all students are appointed a Personal Tutor and have regular one-to-one appointments to track their progress and encourage development.

INTRODUCTION TO LIVING AND STUDYING IN THE UK

Students will develop an understanding of the requirements of higher education (in particular in relation to their chosen area of study) and of living in the UK. These themes have been integrated into the English for Academic Purposes and Personal and Academic Development units.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

Students will develop and improve their English fluency, with a focus on academic English, vocabulary, grammar, written and spoken language, listening and comprehension skills.

ACADEMIC SKILLS

Students will develop key academic skills, including writing, presentation and analysis.

PERSONAL AND ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT

All students will have Tutors, who will work with them throughout their chosen programme and support them in achieving their study goals. Through regular meetings, the Tutor will offer advice to help you to develop study skills and knowledge, ensuring you receive the best possible support and guidance during your Pre-Masters in Business. The tutorials will give you the opportunity to discuss your skills as they develop and consider how they apply to your chosen

postgraduate degree, as well as to help build your confidence and fluency in English. Students can use these one-to-one tutorials to address queries which might arise out of unit studies and Tutors will be able to provide clarification and support for the learning within units. The one-to-one tutorials will also allow tutors to monitor progress and provide extra academic support when needed.

CONTEMPORARY BUSINESS ISSUES

The module aims to develop knowledge, concepts and theories in Business in addition to their importance and application to practice. The module will introduce you to fundamental organisational functions, the business environment, structure, culture and governance.

7a) Statement of the strategy for learning, teaching and academic experience for the programme


This strategy is informed by the current institutional policy on Learning, Teaching and Academic Experience, which also aligns with the University's Strategic Plan and our ambition to become a career led, digitally rich and inclusive institution.

Background

The mission of the Business School (as cited in the recent application for affiliation to the Chartered Association of Business Schools) is to 'develop highly employable, socially and ethically responsible, and digitally capable graduates. It will support business and community to grow and develop. Our collaborative research inspires our students, informs our teaching and supports business and community'. Thus, our Learning and Teaching strategy will contribute to the realisation of this mission.

Guiding Principles

All programmes within the Leeds Trinity University academic portfolio follow the 'Pre-Live-Post' pedagogical structure for all taught classes.



This pedagogical methodology enables our students to engage with the subject matter on multiple levels of learning to enhance their knowledge and understanding. The 'Pre' element of their learning has the purpose of establishing a knowledge base for the topic and occurs ahead of the taught session through a variety of academic-led activities which include (but not exclusively): reading, videos, quizzes and podcasts. The 'Live' (live/synchronous) element of the learning is taught on campus by the academic/s and focuses on the application of academic and professional principles, theories and frameworks through discussion. The final element of the pedagogical structure is 'Post' which reinforces the learning through consolidation activities such as: quizzes, activities, further reading, videos and small assignments (encapsulating varying forms of formative assessment with subsequent feedback mechanisms to aid in student development and progression ahead of summative assessment formats).

The Business School will continue to utilise this overarching pedagogical structure. The 'Live' section will be focused on with subject-level additions and enhancements detailed below.

Within the above 'Pre-Live-Post' structure, we will utilise a 'workshop-style' learning and teaching approach to ensure differential learning, whilst creating a varied, dynamic and informative teaching experience for all.

The key elements of our 'workshop' approach:-

- 1. Our teaching is research-informed, using a mixture of delivery methods (utilising a wide variety of visual/audio media)
- 2. The business world examples we use are contemporary, authentic and relevant, demonstrating clear links to the topic under discussion
- 3. The activities we give our students are realistic, useful and contributing to their careerreadiness
- 4. We will continue to revise our teaching strategies in line with alterations to the sector's recommendations for career attributes (including Leeds Trinity's 'My Career Passport' initiative), the recommendations of the QAA Subject Benchmark Statements on Business and Management 2023 and all affiliated PSRB standards.

As well as developing language and specific academic skills, the Pre-Masters programme has an underlying theme of helping the student to navigate the new experience of living and studying in the UK and the specific requirements of the UK HE system. These latter areas are linked to intercultural awareness, which you will be developing throughout the programme within, for instance, teamwork activities (integrated into English for Academic Purposes and Academic Skills sessions, e.g. interactive class discussions and various team tasks and presentations), academic practices (e.g. academic writing, paraphrasing and referencing, which are covered in Academic Skills and Planning and Writing a Research Proposal sessions) and intercultural

communication (again through the preparation and delivery of class discussions and oral presentations, which are assessed in many of the units).

Applicants will receive a CAS (Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies) form for the Pre-Masters in Business only, in the first instance. If they successfully complete the programme and achieve the required level of English language proficiency, a second CAS will be issued for the postgraduate programme of study to which the applicant is being admitted.
