2 Aims of the programme

Rationale and general aims, including what is special about this programme

The Photography degree at Leeds Trinity is a practice-based course which will develop your technical and creative abilities. The programme aims to:

1. provide a robust academic framework for the study of Photography;
2. develop proficiency in the use of a range of facilities, equipment and software relevant to photography and an ability to use utilise technical
3. question, review and evaluate your ideas and to enhance this ability through sourcing and researching relevant material;
4. connect photographic work to debates about the contestation of social power and the application of ethical principles;
5. prepare you, through the development of an appropriate range of knowledge, skills and attributes, for changing work practices and career pathways including entrepreneurial and freelance work in fields related to photography.

3 Level Learning Outcomes and Employability Outcomes

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5 Indicative Content

<p>Summary of content by theme</p>

The Photography programme enables you to develop discipline-specific skills in four key areas: professional photographic practice; digital imaging; aesthetic analysis, and collaborative project work.

The programme is designed with a progressive and convergent structure that establishes the core knowledge, skills and attributes in the first year and then synthesises them in the second year within pre-defined projects taking, manipulating and curating photographs in order to equip and prepare you for the full-independent project and exhibition work in the final year. In this way, the programme is designed to deliver the four discipline-specific skills through vertical strands that provide a means of developing skills and knowledge in each of these areas across all three years of undergraduate study.

The strands ultimately converge in an extended professional portfolio and a professional-standard exhibition of your work. At Levels 5 and 6 placement modules allow you to test and refine your skills in a professional context, engage in networking and explore the kinds of employment your degree is preparing you for.
